EQUINE MANAGMENT RULES

OHIO CAREER DEVELOPMENT EVENT Effective August 1, 2004

Purpose

The horse management CDE is an educational activity designed as a practical method of teaching students current horse evaluation and selection techniques and management.

Date

State: Spring Career Development Event date held in conjunction with the OSU Dairy Expo. Listed on current registration sheet and/or state schedule

Location: Ohio Exposition Center (State Fairgrounds)

CDE Rules

1. Each school may enter an unlimited number of dues paid FFA members as participants, the top 4 scores will be considered the "team" and the top 3 scores will be the team score of record.

2. Students should bring clipboards and must bring sharpened No. 2 pencils.

3. Any assistance given a team member from any source, except from the contest officials, will disqualify the team member from the contest.

4. The contest will consist of:

a. Two halter classes

b. One performance class

c. A tack and equipment identification session

d. A written examination

e. One class of hay

CDE Format:

Halter Classes

1. Two classes of four horses each from the following breeds will be selected for the purpose of placing:

Appaloosa Arabian Draft Morgan Paint Quarter Saddlebred Standardbred Thoroughbred

2. One halter class will include five objective questions.

Performance Class

1. One performance class of four horses from the following breeds will be placed:

Appaloosa Arabian Morgan Paint Quarter

2. The performance class will include five objective questions. Special Note: Depending upon the availability of horses, any one breed of horses may be used more than once in the halter classes and performance classes.

Written Test

1. The written test will consist of a maximum of fifty (50) objective questions from the following areas of horse management:

*Anatomy

Building and Equipment

Common faults

Health

Nutrition

Pest problems

Principles of horsemanship

Reproduction

*Anatomy may include external, skeletal, internal organs, parts of the gastrointestinal tract, male and female reproductive organs, detailed anatomy of the foot and detailed lower limbs.

2. Sources for test questions will be the references mentioned under the reference section.
